


### **Project Limits**

#### **Format & Materials**


The meeting had three main sections and activities:

Before leaving, attendees were asked to fill out the exit survey shown on the right.








### Q1. How did you hear about the meeting?

48% of those who answered Q1 heard about the meeting online, and 23% heard about it from neighbors.


#### Most neighbors heard about the meeting online

## 61% of respondents live and/or work on Spruce and Pine






### Q4. How do you travel on Spruce & Pine Streets?

### Primarily travel by all modes (multiple choice)






# Q5. What do you think about the city recommendations on Spruce & Pine Streets?
